

Fly of the Month – Throwback

If you were able to join Governor Nixon's presentation last month, you might have heard some discussion on the Point Fifty-Six Percenter fly originally tied by Tom Nixon. We have pulled the original pattern from our archives and presented it here in full. Enjoy.

JAN 85 REISSUE

OZARK FLYFISHERS - FLY OF THE MONTH

"POINT FIFTY SIX PERCENTER"

(A trout fly designed by Tom Nixon specifically to fish the Arkansas tailwaters. OF member Jerry Nixon, his brother, has kindly furnished us with pattern information. Thanks to you both for furnishing this dope.)

THREAD: Black HOOK: #6 to #16 4XL Mustad #79580 or equivalent.

TAILS: Wood duck flank feather fibers, sparse.

WEIGHT: 10-12 turns lead wire as follows - #6 use .032, #8 use .025, #10 use .020" #12 use .018", #14 use .014", #16 use .014".

BELLY: Stripe of yellow yarn, single strand.


BODY: Oxford gray wool yarn, slim. Untwist yarn so it can be applied like floss. HACKLE: Sparse palmered grizzly saddle hackle. Strip all fibers from one side.

Tie in small clump of tail fibers. Wind on lead wire, 10-12 turns, allowing space behind and ahead of windings. Wrap over lead with tying thread and coat with cement to secure it's position. Install yarn for belly stripe on bottom of hook where bend starts. Attach gray body yarn and half-stripped hackle feather at the tail position and build up smooth fillet of tying thread at each end of lead windings to form a smooth juncture with hook shank. Untwist the gray yarn and wind on smoothly, using only enough to cover the lead, forming a long, slim body. Run the yarn for belly stripe forward on underside of body and tie off at head position. Wrap the hackle, palmering sparsely in wide spirals (approx. 4 turns), tie off, form small head, whip finish and cement. Clip a few of the hackle fibers to about 1/16" to make the hackle even more sparse and to form a bit of a short stubble.

This is an extremely simple fly to tie, but don't let that fool you....some of the most effective flies are the simplest. There have been some wild claims made for the effectiveness of the Point Fifty Six...so we owe it to ourselves to tie a few and give it a fair try. The name of the fly was originally chosen to poke fun at certain Eastern dry fly purists, who obviously fished only the dry fly 99.44% of the time. So, in order to be known as "100% Fishermen", the .56%er enables all purists to utilize the time between hatches by fishing the riffle above their favorite pool, under the guise of "killing time". (I think that's how the story goes??)

Anyway, this fly has taken its share of 6 pounders out of the White River. Larger sizes seem to work better in the warmer months. Sizes up through #12 work well through early October. In the winter and spring (through the 1st of April) 16's, 18's and even 20's are much superior. The small flies are fished 2 on a leader; one tied in as a dropper. At all times, fish it upstream. Other colors have been tried, but gray seems most consistent on all size fish. The small flies from Dec. to April are particularly effective.

Note: I have caught fish at Bennett with this fly. Editor



CURRENT RIVER TROPHY AREA MAY IMPROVE:

DAVE MAYERS RECOMMENDS ARTIFICIAL LURES

On March second there was an informational assembly held by the MDC to discuss the state of the Current River and proposed policy to improve it. The featured speaker was Dave Mayers, the Fisheries Management Biologist responsible for the Current River.

The problem with the Current River Trophy Area was there are too few trout attaining the 15" trophy size. A streamside survey with 2000 interviews found that the typical angler was not happy about the general state of the fishery,

specifically, about the lack of fish which attain any size. the survey, slightly more than half of the interviewed anglers fished with bait. Real science (and native intelligence) indicates that fish caught and released by bait users died at significantly higher rates than those caught and released using artificial lures. If my memory serves me correctly, the ratios were 1 in 4 bait caught fish die as a consequence of being caught while 1 in 20 lure caught fish die as a consequence of being caught. other words, a fish is 5 times more likely to die from bait fishing as opposed to lure fishing.

The typical stocked brown trout is typically caught 3 1/2 times per year. How many survive a fishing season? Obviously, not many. No wonder so few fish attain 15" length. This is not rocket science, folks.

This is elementary statistical analysis which makes one wonder why it took so long for such conclusions to be reached.

Mr. Mayers is suggesting an artificial lure zone from Montauk Park lower boundary to the bridge at Cedar Grove.

This stretch is stocked annually with 8,000 9' fish. The decline in mortality and consequent increase in life expectancy should result in an increase in fish size.
