Book Review: "THE GUIDES SPEAK"

Yesterday I received an advance copy of <u>Fly Fishing The White and Norfork Rivers The Guides Speak</u>. It was edited by Keith Campbell. This is a book about fly fishing our local rivers. Its premise is to present in depth interviews of fly fishing icons, Dave Whitlock and Dale Fulton. There are also interviews with seven local guides, Steve Dally, Chad Johnson, Ron McQuay, Jim Traylor, Hank Wilson, Davy Wotton and me. I received an advance copy because I was interviewed for the book.

In addition to the interviews there are chapters on the White and Norfork Rivers (including history and safety), maps of the White and Norfork Rivers and suggestions for different styles of fishing.

I was most interested in the interviews with the icons on the White and Norfork Rivers, Dave Whitlock and Dale Fulton. I was an early fan of Dave Whitlock. I have all of his books, several pieces of his art and have listened to his lectures for years. I have learned a lot from him. He is also one of the greatest fly tyers around. I regularly fish his patterns and have caught an incredible number of fish on them. I found his interview fascinating and found out things about him that I never knew before.

The interview about Dale Fulton was especially meaningful to me. He passed away a few years ago. We were friends and I miss him. I worked for him as a guide years ago at his Blue Ribbon Fly Shop and I learned a lot about guiding from him. After I established myself as an independent guide I would stop by and talk to him whenever I was near the shop or would stop by his lodge to chat. His interview told me a lot about him that I never knew.

I know and have worked with almost all of the guides included in the book. They are all solid guides that know how to catch


trout. Each guide explained his guiding. The interviews were all similar in some of the questions asked. How did you get started in guiding? This is where every guide had a different story. They were all interesting. The best question was common mistakes I see my clients make. I really thought that this would be useful to any reader. They were also asked about their favorite flies and how we could grow bigger rainbow trout.

There is also a section on flies that has photos and recipes for the guide's favorite flies.

This cost to publish this book was provided by the North Arkansas Fly Fishers and club president, Dave Boyer. Proceeds from the book are earmarked for selected youth programs in Baxter and Marion Counties. The book will be available at :

My Fly-Fishing Adventure

This year my second fly fishing trip to Steamboat Springs occurred during the last week of a very dry Colorado July. The Yampa River that flows from the Stage Coach Reservoir through Steamboat Springs was completely closed by the Colorado DNR to any recreational activities due to falling water levels and rising water temperatures. Any fishing activity was to be organized by an outfitter with access to private ranches. This requirement proved to be a fantastic opportunity for superb fishing. In my case, the private land was located outside the town of Phippsburg (6500 Feet above sea level), 35 miles south and slightly east of the Steamboat Springs outfitter. The daily temperature range of the area was between 58 degree F in the early morning and 73 degrees F. by afternoon.

The water temperature was hovering in the middle 60 degree F and would climb as the day progressed into the range that would stress the Trout. As a result, this trip would be a half day event, per the Colorado DNR. The barometric pressure was 30.36 in this area. High cumulus clouds indicated possible rains later in the day. The area for fishing was a lengthy, though occasionally narrow, free flowing stream with numerous riffles, pools, and easily fordable areas. This fly-fishing trip was to be a a true 'high sticking' and 'pendulum cast' fishing experience. My guide, Ryan Y was a local fly fisherman with over 20 years' experience, not only in NW Colorado, but also 16 years in Alaska. Ryan has a great sense of humor and patience beyond the pale.

Proud that I was of all my newly tied midges, Beatis, PMD, Trycos, and Wolley Buggers, Ryan preferred to use his own flies and supplies. Who can argue with that experience? I brought two 5 wt Sage rods with 2 Lamson Liquid reels wrapped with floating weight forward lines and 5 wt leaders.

Ryan rigged one rod with a nymph system consisting of a plastic strike indicator, a San Juan worm, two lead weights, a lower curved #12 hook and a beaded disco midge on an 18 hook as the dropper. This rig was to be fish with the pendulum cast and high stick technique with short drifts. During one of our many conversations throughout this experience, Ryan mentioned the he occasionally has clients that ask him, "How many fish are we going to catch?" His answer was routinely. "None!"

The second 5wt rod was rigged with a streamer/Wholly on a #8 straight hook, white in color and laced with colors throughout the marabou. Ryan called his fly a 'balanced leach' as he did not use a bead, but a thin nail tied over the middle of the hook to keep



the fly 'balanced'. This system was to be fished with a jigging motion after the streamer had sunk below the surface. Given my experiences with 'high sticking' was minimal, the educational process began early. Using a guide with Ryan's local experience proved invaluable on several level

1. Learning new casting techniques. The importance of a tight and accurately placed casts was the rule due to limited space and heavy tread shrubs lining the creeks.

2. Understanding how the rigging was supposed to be developed.

3. Importantly, Ryan was familiar with the potential areas that could hold trout.

My Fly Fishing Adventure (con't)

I had a unique experience of actually seeing that ledges, foam trails, dark water, rifle, and pools can hold trout. What I had to learn is that one cannot rush fly fishing....one lateral step after another to make sure you have covered as much to the creek as possible, stop wasting one's time walking the creek side without addressing all the opportunities. For every trout I caught, I missed dozens more due to inexperience. However, having felt the tug, seen the flash, or lost the fish once on the hook proved to be the best teacher.

While the pendulum cast was a preferred tactic, I am proud on my developing roll cast. I hit the marks more often then not. Was Ryan's cajoling, advising, correcting, and never-ending patience important? Are 5 20" rainbows and 2 18" Whites worth the 5 hours spent on a high country creek during a serious drought? For this entry level OFF member...YES!!!

Ironically, using either the nymph system or the streamer proved to be of equal value for my fishing experience. Ryan changed out my rigged rods on an episodic basis to make sure I had the experience of using a nymph and streamer system. Ryan advised me that his years of experience, the time of the summer, a rising Trico hatch that the trout were ignoring, and the lack of trout surfacing all indicated to him that my experiences would be richer with using two different systems and avoid multiple changes in flies. *John Steuterman, Jr.*


Next Meeting: August 26, 2021 – 7:00 PM Guest Speaker: Skip Morris




