Join by computer

- Have a headphones available if possible to minimize feedback your cellphone earbuds will work well.
- Click the **Zoom link** that's been sent to you in an email, and Zoom should automatically and quickly download to your computer.
- In Downloads on your computer, click Zoom\_launcher.exe. Zoom should direct you to this with a large orange flag.
- Once Zoom has launched, a screen should pop up asking for your name. This will identify you during the meeting.
- You should now be part of the meeting. Click the green button that says "Join Audio By Computer".

#### Join by tablet or smartphone

- If you choose to use your tablet or smartphone, be sure to download the Zoom app ahead of time.
- Once you have downloaded the Zoom app, follow the "Join by computer" instructions above.

#### Join by telephone

- First, dial the phone number provided in the Zoom email.
- When prompted, dial the meeting ID number that is also provided.
- Your phone will be automatically muted once the meeting starts. If you want to speak, press \*6 to unmute.

They are best friends at the vise, on the water, at the computer keyboard, behind the camera, and in their Zoom studio. When they are not working, they enjoy spoiling their four grand children. #### **Wonder Wing Drake**

**Wonder Wing Drake Materials** 

- Hook: Size 20 to 8, 1-x long dry fly
- Thread: Gray, 70 denier (6/0) in size
- Tail: Whiting Tailing Pack fibers or grizzly hackle fibers
- Wings: Large grizzly feathers, looped Wonder Wing style
- Body: Gray Soft Touch Dubbing or color of choice
- Hackle: Grizzly or color(s) of choice
- Head: Thread

**Student notes:** The wings on this fly allow the student to use any large hackle to make delicate, small (or large) dry fly wings. Once this technique is mastered,



the student will never again have to search through a hen or rooster cape to find a matched pair of hackle-point wings.

#### **The Rotary Stimulator**

**Modified Rotary Stimulator Materials** 

- **Hook:** 18-8 3XL, dry fly (straight or curved shank)
- Thread: Black, olive or color of choice
- Tail: Elk or deer hair
- Body Hackle: Grizzly or color of choice
- Body: Olive Soft Touch Dubbing or color of choice
- Wing: Deer or elk
- Head: Peacock herl (optional dubbing color of choice)
- Front Hackle: Grizzly or color of choice

**Student notes:** We refer to this pattern as a "modified" Stimulator because it doesn't totally



follow the original recipe. Our purpose with this pattern is to NOT show you how to tie the fly, but rather to use the fly to learn some secrets hidden within your inline rotary vise. We finish with the question, "Can an inline rotary vise make spinning hair a walk-in-the-park?" You'll have to wait and see when we demonstrate the "surprise" fly pattern.

## Fly of the Month - February 2021

#### WD-40 Midge

I tie a lot of flies. I like tying new and different flies. I, also, carry a lot of flies on the river. However, I still find myself tying on the same go-to flies every time I hit the streams. This is one of them. It is genius in its simplicity, super durable, very versatile, and a proven fish catcher everywhere it is thrown.

#### **Materials**

Hook: Your favorite scud hook Size 16 – 20 (preferably barbless)

• Thread: 12/0 Veevus Olive

Tail/Wing Case: Lemon Wood Duck Flank

Body: Tying Thread

• Thorax: Grey Muskrat dubbing

#### **Tying Steps**

- 1. Pinch down barb on hook, and secure hook in vise. Start thread 1/3 back from the hook eye and advance to hook bend using touching wraps.
- 2. Tie in a tail of 6-8 wood duck fibers about as long as the body and wrap down using even touching thread wraps to form an even, smooth body ending where the thread started.



- 3. Leave the butts of the wood duck fibers for the wing case and pull back to leave room for the thorax.
- 4. Dub a rather prominent thorax of the muskrat dubbing between the body and the hook eye.
- 5. Pull the wood duck fibers over the thorax and secure just behind the eye.
- 6. Form a neat head with thread, whip-finish, and trim thread.

I like to fish this as a dropper behind either a dry fly when fishing near the top, or behind a heavier nymph when fishing deep. It mimics small mayfly nymphs and midges alike. It can be tied in olive, tan, gray, and black – all with the same wood duck tail and wing case and gray thorax.



Over at the counter, Tom is showing recently taken pictures of his trip to Bull Shoals tail water. One in particular comes to mind: Gary Balke is holding a huge brown trout with a set of teeth that matched those in his broad smiling face. Gary has this trout clutched against his chest for one reason: If he tried to advance it toward the camera (as we often do) it would pull him over on his face. It was a fish that gets a man to thinking. Dr. Bill Popovic is looking at the picture with an expression that says "book the hunt!" Dr. Bill Friedman, also in the picture viewing crowd, drops the first shoe and says "Who's ready?" Warren Couch, who has already seen the pictures in the first to respond. Tom kicked the ball along by reminding us that Gastons's Lodge offers half price rates during January/. Before the next round of Oban was history, "the hunt was booked." Dr. Bill volunteered to drive, and Dr. Pop offered to bring the scotch and the old redhead signed up for the food.

The following Wednesday, a tad ahead of the afternoon traffic, three of us departed the parking lot in Bill's bright red Ford. Bill had made reservations at Gastons for one of the two bedroom suites. I mention this because they offer ample food for four fishermen, cooking chocolates and a lovely fireplace with free firewood. We also

secured the services of two guides for two days. A must if the turbines are in operation that is a sure thing in midwinter. Warren Couch and his son Mark ware a good hour ahead of us. That was good. There would be a warm fire to greet us and glasses at the ready.

We were approaching Cuba on I44 before someone had the audacity to mention the position of the sun with regards the yardarm. Dr. Pop, from his comfortable seat besides the cooler provided a toddy for the body while Bill regaled us with selections from popular Broadway musicals with the volume of his surround-sound set just below permanent hearing loss. Not to mention the fact that my pant cuffs were being singed by the heater. On several occasions I serriptitiously nudged the temperature selector toward the blue. Dr. Pop complained it was so cold he couldn't pour the Oban because the neck was icing up. By the time we reached Lakeview Arkansas, we were ready to eat the labels of the corned beef hash cans. The Cow Shed was suggested by someone as a suitable steakhouse and since we couldn't find the 178 club, it was the Cow Shed. I attributed the fact that it was virtually empty to the hour. The fine cuts of meat on display in cooler by the door were encouraging. So we ordered. Friedman and Popovic selected 28 ounce Tbones. I went for the sirloin strip, rare. The salad was excellent but I could have

walked back to St. Louis on the steak.

I awoke in the morning to the smell of fresh brewed coffee. Warren, God bless him was in the kitchen cooking breakfast. We were to meet the guides at 7:30 by the public boat ramp next to the Bull Shoals Campground. I was in hopes we would get to wade a little but all eight turbines were in operation and the river was bank full.

Since Jim's boat was the bigger of the two, Warren, Mark and I went with him. Jim is a pleasant sort; a big man that could pass for Santa in work clothes. His boat boasted two lean-back fishing seats which were comfortable to fish from. My reel was loaded with a shooting line similar to a #2 level fly line. The leader was 2X down to a 1/8 bell sinker. The tippet held two small egg flies.

Warren and Mark had good hook ups on their first drift. Colorful rainbow and brown about 15 inches. For a half hour, I couldn't buy a strike. After at least six pattern changes, I tried a shad fly. We had seen a few dead shad about an inch long and the gulls near the dam were in a feeding frenzy. In two minutes I had my first strike, a beautiful 18 inch rainbow. For nearly an hour I had one of those "fish on every cast experiences. Warren and Mark got an occasional fish but I was having a ball. The casting technique with so much lead weight is what is

called chuck and duck. Thirty feet of line is stripped off the reel and by deft roll of the wrist, is cast broadside into the water. In a few seconds, the tick tick of the lead weight in the riverbed gravel is the telltale sign of a proper drift. A tug on the lie is caused by one of three things: a snag on a rock, sub surface vegetation or a fish. All are met with a quick lift of the rod tip. A rock usually disengages itself, a steady pull means moss, a fish hook up is obvious. If one of your companions gets a fish on, get your lie out of the water now! A ten pound brown will give an angler all he can handle. Extra line in the water can mean a lost fish. Halford would roll over in his grave at this type of fly fishing, not excepting the catch and release. However, this isn't the River Test during a sedge hatch. For two days of fishing I didn't see one disappointed fisherman with a scowl on his face.

At about eleven o'clock the trout got lockjaw. For half and hour not a single fish was taken from either boat. We agreed a little food for the inner man was in order so we headed for the boat dock. The other boat soon followed.

A satisfying nip of brandy put a warm touch to our innards and we enjoyed Hillary Friedman's tasty sandwiches. It seems as though Bill Popovic took the biggest fish, a hook jawed brown estimated at ten pounds plus. We all agreed, spawning browns are as

beautiful as any fish alive. Their spots are glistening beacons and their flanks bright golden brown. The catch and release program instituted by the Arkansas conservation people is producing a world class fishery in the White river and its tributaries. Any time from the first of the year through mid- February is good If for some reason, the turbines at the dam are not running, the water will be wadeable and you will have the added pleasure of sight fishing to huge trout. Twenty five pounders can be found in these waters. Take your life preserver and your hearing aid. Wading can be dangerous whey they pull the plug at the dam.

Late in February, when the shad kill occurs, the trout and gulls feed in a frenzy and this simple pattern tied with white marabou on a # 10 3X long hook is a killer, and during the spawning season, eggs, eggs and eggs. Egg color... let the guide or success decide. Mid week is best if you can get away. There were five boats using the best part of a mile of water on Thursday. By the time we left for home, the parking lot was loaded with cars, trucks and boats. Gaston does not keep the restaurant open in the winter so take someone along who can cook. Sorry, but Warren is booked for the year.
