





Fly of the Month – July 2021

Countach Jig Nymph "Plus"

I'm always cruising around the internet looking for the next great fly pattern. I came across a warm water fly fishing page with loads of photos of enormous bluegill caught on the Countach Jig Nymph Plus. Because everything in on Google, I found this little gem of a fly with an interesting controversy as to where it originated. The story is that Clark "Cheech" Pierce of FlyFishFood created the Countach Nymph while John Newbury created an almost identical fly called the Knuckle Dragger. When the two were both named to the Fulling Mill Pro Staff, they learned of each other's fly, and had a good laugh. While the original is a great looking fly, apparently the "Plus" version with the addition of antron in the abdomen and a tiny marabou tail is the "bomb".

Materials

- Hook: Barbless jig hook size 12 (Firehole 516)
- Bead: 1/8" tungsten, black nickel
- Thread: 8/0 Orange or Brown (orange if you want a hot spot)
- Legs: Grizzly Sili-Legs Rootbeer
- Tail: Tan Marabou
- Abdomen: Antron dubbing, Rust or Red Fox Squirrel Back
- Ribbing: Midge Diamond Braid Pearl or Rootbeer
- Thorax: Micro Pine Squirrel Zonker, Rust or Red Fox Squirrel back hair



Tying Steps

- 1. Position bead on hook and secure in vise. Start thread behind bead and advance to hook bend.
- 2. Tie in a marabou tail about as long as the hook shank. Tie in a section of the sili legs on each side of the tail just slightly longer than the tail.
- 3. Tie in the Diamond Braid ribbing, and then dub a tapered body to about the 3/4 point on the hook shank. Evenly wrap the ribbing to the thorax and tie off. Trim excess.
- 4. Make a dubbing loop just behind the bead. Trim the pine squirrel hair off of the zonker strip and put it into the dubbing loop so that it is fairly sparse and has the tip ends longer than the butt ends. Spin your dubbing loop to make a spikey noodle and make two wraps to form the collar. Tie off and trim the excess thread loop.
- 5. Tie in a section of leg material on each side of the hook between the collar and the bead extending out both front and back.
- 6. Whip finish the thread and trim excess.

The photo actually has way too much of a collar, but you get the idea. I fish this like most warm water flies – short twitching retrieve or as a dropper under a popper. It is also great if you can find bedding bluegill or cruising carp. They will take it too. I also found it tied in all black, and all tan so don't be afraid to experiment. You may also want to experiment with the bead size. Since ponds and lakes generally do not have much current, a full-size tungsten bead may be too heavy and sink too fast.

How Safe Are We Now?

In an article I saw this morning, I was dismayed to see that Missouri was among the states with the lowest vaccination rates (~38% currently). When you look on a map detailing rates of vaccination by county it is clear the most poorly vaccinated areas are rural, sparsely populated areas. In particular, where most of us like to fly fish in this state with rates less than 24 %!. But what really got my attention was data recently published about the rise of cases of the new Delta mutation (in particular, Delta Plus) that was first seen last year arising in India but now found globally. Right now, this variant accounts for 29% of all cases in Missouri. This is especially serious in the Springfield area it appears.

So far, the two most commonly used vaccines here in Missouri have shown reasonably good efficacy against the variants that have popped up (as the ID folks predicted they would). The problem we face with the Delta Plus variant is that it has much higher transmissibility rates. The bad news: there are cases of fully vaccinated patients testing positive for DP. The good news: they are far less likely to become severely ill.

The US vaccination rate is averaging 46%, so why is Missouri and so many nearby states lagging so far behind? I have yet to find any seriously done investigation into why we have vaccine hesitancy, but an article posted on the Milwaukee Journal Sentinel's webpage cited a project done by the Kaiser Family Foundation COVID-19 Vaccine Monitor shed some light on this. They found that 13% said they would "definitely not"get a vaccination for COVID-19. 17% of respondents stated that the vaccine was "too new, there's not enough information about it or its long-term effects are unknown." The three next most common reasons, each cited by 8% of respondents, are" that they don't believe the vaccine is effective, they don't need it and they don't know what's in it." Other reasons include being concerned about "side effects, not liking vaccines in general and not being concerned about contracting COVID-19".

I am posting this to the membership because I know there is a crap-load of rumor, inuendo and hearsay about COVID and vaccination. Were I still practicing medicine, I would advise patients in the 55-80 yr age group in particular, who want to go trout fishing in our rural regions to practice the same precautions you learned in 2020, but the most important being: (1) social distancing when among unvaccinated people or whose vaccination status is unknown (2) prudent hand-washing and use of alcohol gels.

- Once Zoom has launched, a screen should pop up asking for your name. This will identify you during the meeting.
- You should now be part of the meeting. Click the green button that says "Join Audio By Computer".

Join by tablet or smartphone

- If you choose to use your tablet or smartphone, be sure to download the Zoom app ahead of time.
- Once you have downloaded the Zoom app, follow the "Join by computer" instructions above.

Join by telephone

- First, dial the phone number provided in the Zoom email.
- When prompted, dial the meeting ID number that is also provided.
- Your phone will be automatically muted once the meeting starts. If you want to speak, press *6 to unmute.

Beginners Fly-Tying Class


