Join by computer

- Have a headphones available if possible to minimize feedback your cellphone earbuds will work well.
- Click the **Zoom link** that's been sent to you in an email, and Zoom should automatically and quickly download to your computer.
- In Downloads on your computer, click Zoom_launcher.exe. Zoom should direct you to this with a large orange flag.
- Once Zoom has launched, a screen should pop up asking for your name. This will identify you during the meeting.
- You should now be part of the meeting. Click the green button that says "Join Audio By Computer".

Join by tablet or smartphone

- If you choose to use your tablet or smartphone, be sure to download the Zoom app ahead of time.
- Once you have downloaded the Zoom app, follow the "Join by computer" instructions above.

Join by telephone

- First, dial the phone number provided in the Zoom email.
- When prompted, dial the meeting ID number that is also provided.
- Your phone will be automatically muted once the meeting starts. If you want to speak, press *6 to unmute.

We want to start on time – please allow extra time to get online! In consideration of the whole group, **please arrive 15 minutes early** in order to get successfully connected. Someone will be on hand to help you if needed. This is especially important if this is your first time using Zoom. If you come late to the conversation and have difficulties connecting, please disconnect and phone in.

Fly of the Month - October 2020

The Red Hot Chili Pepper

For those who scoff at the lowly wooly bugger, this one is special. With the recent passing of Tony Spezio, North Arkansas Fly Fisher, fly tier, rod builder, plane builder, and Sow Bug Roundup mainstay, this fly has special meaning. Not only does it catch fish anywhere, it brings back memories of the limited time I was able to sit with Tony at the annual SowBug Roundups. He was truly an asset to the fly fishing community and just a great human being. He will be missed, but his fly lives on.

Tying Materials

• Hook: Your Favorite 3X or 4X Streamer hook #6-8

Bead: Appropriately Sized Brass Bead

Weight: .020 Lead Wire

Thread: Florescent Orange Veevus 8/0

Tail: Burnt Orange Marabou

Flash: Copper Krystal Flash

Body: Copper Tinsel Chenille

Hackle: Brown or Ginger Saddle Hackle



Tying Steps

- 1. Place bead oh hook and secure in vise. Wrap lead wire over 2/3rd of the hook shank and slide up against the bead. Start thread behind lead wraps and secure the lead wraps with crossing thread wraps back and forth ending with the thread at the hook bend.
- 2. Tie in the marabou tail slightly longer than the hook shank. Trim excess.
- 3. Tie in 3 strands of Krystal Flash at their middles, fold over so there are 3 strands down each side of the tail. Trim to just longer than the tail.
- 4. Tie in saddle hackle by its tip, then tie in the tinsel chenille by its thread core.
- 5. Advance thread to just behind the bead.
- 6. Wrap the tinsel chenille to the bead and secure with thread wraps and trim excess.
- 7. Spiral wrap the hackle to the bead brushing the fibers rearward as you go. Secure with thread wraps and trim excess. Brush some super glue on a couple of inches of the thread and whip finish thread behind the bead.

Tony said you couldn't fish the Chili Pepper wrong – strip it, swing it, or fish it dead-drift under an indicator. Throw it in warm water for bass, bluegill, crappie, and even catfish. Who knows… It might even be a good carp and redfish fly.

Flyfishing for Gar

I found a pool on a lowland Mississippi tributary that has lots of gars. During late summer/early fall when the water is low they are confined to a smaller area. Gars can breathe air, and you can see them surfacing to gulp air at the surface. This allows them to survive in warm water with little oxygen. I sometimes saw 3 or 4 fish rising at a time and it wasn't hard to figure out where they were concentrated. In the past I have caught a few gars sight-fishing with unweighted streamers like Hornbergs. If you can cast a streamer near their nose without spooking them while they are on the surface, they will take the fly but they usually don't get hooked on a traditional fly because their jaws are so bony that the hook doesn't penetrate. I suppose that if you don't see gars rising, there is not much point in fishing for them, but based on what I saw that day there were plenty in a small area that would make blind-casting for them a successful endeavor.

I tied up some special gar flies that have no hook just nylon rope that tangles in their teeth. I tied it on a 35mm articulated shank, like the kind you use for articulated streamers. To tie the fly, I covered the shank with red thread and attached a large lead dumbbell eye 2 eye-lengths behind the eye of the shank. I got some cheap 1/4" nylon rope, the kind with a multi-stranded inner core surrounded by a woven nylon sheath, and cut two 6" sections. I pulled the inner cores out and secure one core to each side of the shank butted up to the dumbbell eyes. Next. I tied in two red saddle hackles at the rear end of the shank and wrapped forward with close wraps to represent the gills. Finally, I wrapped pearl frizzle chenille from the front of the gills around the shank up to, between, and just forward of the eyes and tied off the head.



I launched my canoe and paddled to where I saw the rises. I dropped my small anchor and saw gars coming up all around me. There are three species of gar there. Longnose gar have very long jaws that are narrow when viewed from above. Shortnose gars have shorter laws that are broader when viewed from above. Spotted gar look like shortnose gars, but with spots all over their bodies. All three species have spots on their fins. Alligator gar, which can grow to 10 feet in length and weigh 300 pounds, disappeared from our region during the mid-1900's but both Illinois and Missouri are stocking them now. I didn't see any of those.



I got out my 8-weight and casted my gar fly on a sinktip line and slowly retrieve it. Occasionally the fly would stop when a gar grabbed it. I missed about half of the strikes and there was no need to set the hook since there is no hook. I just tightened up when the line got firm and either I had them or I didn't. The first evening I landed two spotted gars each around 18-24" long and missed several others, including a large longnose gar that I saw grab my fly but quickly shed it. When the spotted gar got tangled with the fly they jumped and darted at the surface but were easily brought to hand. Getting the gars disentangled from the fly can be a challenge. Sometimes if you just hold the leader and lift their heads out of the water they will free themselves. Usually I had to bring the fish into the canoe and pull the strands from between their teeth one at a time. (Continued on page 6.)

Flyfishing for Gar (con't)

Because they can breath air, gars can survive out of water for hours so they are pretty tough. They are also armored with thick ganoid scales and have long pointy teeth so I wear gloves when I handle them. At one point that evening I saw a large catfish come up off the bottom and grab my fly, but without a hook I had no purchase and it quickly slipped away.

The next night I landed two longnose gar around 28-32" in length and had a shortnose gar right up to the canoe before it freed itself. Then the big one hit. It grabbed the fly and sounded for the bottom. I thought I was snagged until it moved. Had I somehow managed to connect with a large catfish? The fish had my 8-weight rod doubled over for about 5-8 minutes as it ran circles around me and then just kind of gave up. The big gar eventually rolled up next to my canoe and I grabbed its bony jaws with my gloved hand and hauled it in. Sagittiform (arrow-shaped) fish like pike and gars are built for acceleration but not for endurance. They fight hard at first The fish was 43" long and weighed but are quick to tire. approximately 8-10 lbs. I paddled to shore and asked an astonished bait-fisher to snap a picture of me with my trophy, before releasing it unharmed back into the pool. I think that for me gar fishing will be a seasonal event for late summer/early fall when the bass are still sluggish during the daytime and the water is too warm to fish for



muskies. If you can find a place where the gars are rising, you should give it a try!
